- → I missed the 8:00 train this morning.

 Consequently, I was late for work.
- → You should read the job description carefully.

 Furthermore, you should find out more information about the company on the internet.
- → He noticed that there were two people following him. **Moreover**, he realised they were furious.
- → I understand what you're saying. **However**, I cannot agree.
- → Your performance was good. **Nevertheless**, it could have been a lot better.
