- 9.9 NASA (abbrev) /'næsə/ National Aeronautics and Space Administration, an organisation that studies and sends people to space ● NASA, the American space agency, has sent a spacecraft to Mars. ◆ NASA
- 9.10 develop (v) /dɪ'veləp/ to become bigger, more advanced, etc.
 Young animals have to grow and develop and learn many things. ➤ development (n), developed (adj) � (se) développer

- 9.11 cube (n) /kjuːb/ square object with six sides ● The dice we used to play the game were red cubes.
 > cubic (adj) ◆ cube
- **9.12 3D printer** (n) /θriː diː 'prɪntə(r)/ a machine that reproduces objects from digital information by using layers of material ● *The protective face masks were made by a 3D printer.* ◆ imprimante 3D
- 9.13 bounce (v) /baons/ to hit a surface and immediately move back away from it ● *It was raining so hard the water* was bouncing off the road. > bounce (n)

- 9.14 herd (n) /h3:d/ a group of animals ● A herd of cows came running towards us across the field. ❖ troupeau
- 9.15 buffalo (n) /'bʌfələʊ/ an animal like a very large cow or bull with thick curved horns ● On our visit to India, we saw a herd of water buffalo beside a river.

- 9.16 stage (n) /sterdʒ/ a part of a process ● The preparation for the mission to Mars is in its final stage. ❖ étape, stade

- 9.18 GPS (n) /dgi: pi: es/ global positioning system, a system that shows where sb/sth is located using signals from satellites • We didn't get lost on holiday because our GPS told us where we were. * GPS
- 9.19 receiver (n) /rɪ'si:və(r)/ a piece of equipment that picks up signals and changes them to sound or images ● Most new cars now include a GPS receiver to make it easy to find the best route. > reception (n), receive (v) ◆ récepteur

 You need to install an app to be able to read the news stories. ➤ installation (n)
